
Welcome to the January edition.

How Old Are You?

Birthdays are celebrated in most cultures today. It's the measuring stick for determining how long we have been living. Many cultures have developed their unique ways of celebrating being a year older, but the Egyptians were said to be the pioneers in starting such celebrations. Why though? Did it start with the intention to measure our years on earth? You may be surprised to know the truth behind birthdays.

For the Egyptians, the celebration of a birthday had a very deep meaning to it; it was only when the pharaohs "were crowned gods they were birthed," according to one historical source. This is interesting because the first occasion to celebrate a birthday of a human being was done to honour him as "a god."

Equally interesting is the biblical mention of birthdays. Yes, the Holy Bible also talks about birthdays, but not the birthday of any prophet, Jesus Christ, his disciples, or apostles. There are three instances where this occurs. First in **Genesis 40:1-23**, where **Pharaoh** celebrated his birthday by executing his chief baker; then in **Matt. 14: 3-11**, where during **King Herod's** birthday celebration, he instructed the beheading of **John the Baptist**; and in **Job 1-4**, where his children were celebrating birthdays.

On each of these three occasions, when birthdays were celebrated, something dreadful happened. Why? Is this telling us something? If the origin dates to the worship of false gods, and not to measure our age, perhaps there's more to birthdays than we can ever imagine.

Ecc. 3:2 talks about "a time to be born, and a time to die," yet it tells us nothing about a celebration. **Psalm 90: 10** says "The days of our years are threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years yet is their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away." That verse, too, tells us nothing about celebrating each year we get older. In fact, what it warns about is our temporariness. Verse 12 says, "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto **wisdom**." (emphasis mine)

Ephesians 5: 14 also gives us a warning about making use of our years, "Wherefore he saith, awake thou that sleepest, and arise from the dead, and Christ shall give thee light. See then that ye walk circumspectly, not as fools, but as wise, redeeming the time, because the days are evil. Wherefore be ye not **unwise** but understanding what the will of the Lord is." For many people, a birthday is a big deal; the celebrations go on for days and even weeks. Certainly, people can be thankful to God for sparing our lives and giving us another year; we should be wise, as the scripture says to make good and worthwhile use of our time because we don't know what tomorrow may bring. No one is saying not to acknowledge being a year older, however, there's wisdom to be mindful, in this case, of its origins, lest we take it to a level where it shouldn't go. Just like Christmas which is characterized by excesses and undoubtedly idolatry and other sins.

A few days ago, billions of people celebrated what they believe is the birthday of Jesus, the Christ, who wasn't even born on that Day. It's evident from the Bible and historical sources that Jesus was not born anywhere near **December 25**. It's also evident that the Holy Bible does not sanction birthdays because not one of God's holy men had any such celebration. Where did it come from then?

The practice of having huge celebrations on birthdays had its origin in false Egyptian religions. Yet, the world turned its attention, as it does every December 25 to bestow what they feel is an honour to the Son of God by celebrating his birthday with in many cases, drunkenness, gluttony, and other excesses that are not in the spirit of adoration and honour to the Great God we worship. In fact, those excesses were associated with the pagan festivals, namely the **Saturnalia** (honouring Saturn the god of agriculture), the god **Mithra's** birthday on December 25, or the **Dies Natalis Solis Invicti** (the birthday of the Invincible Sun), all of which were celebrated in the December period now associated with Christmas. It's no wonder the Christmas celebrations have so much in common with them – that's where they originated!

Should we be surprised when we see how big and far-reaching the Christmas celebrations have been getting? They're now part of the culture, and Christmas is celebrated by Christians and non-Christians alike. Once celebrations such as Christmas become a cultural affair, there's no stopping them; Christmas is here to stay, whether we like it or not, and even when it has nothing to do with the birth of the Jewish Messiah.

Christmas tree, Santa Claus, etc.; adherents can invent all the excuses they want, all the great sermons trying to justify the celebrations, the question will always remain. What do these symbols, and the nature of the celebrations have to do with the birth of Our Saviour, albeit, the wrong date? This sends a strong message because why is God hiding the date from us?

Isn't it ironic that this Great God has His commanded festivals or appointed times that he establishes for humanity, not just Israel, to celebrate at set seasons? Yet the world spurns them, brands them "Jewish" and says there's no need for all that **Old Testament** stuff. The ones he established, and which mankind will have to keep when He returns (Zech 14), or the man-made ones all rooted in pagan dates and seasons?

As we enter a new calendar year, another birthday is coming for sure. But as you celebrate your birthday whenever it comes around, ask yourself what are the reasons behind your celebrations. PAUL -A Hero Of The Faith

Although he was the leading persecutor of Christians in the first years of the new faith, Paul became a believer in Jesus, and the most influential voice-after Jesus Himself-in the history of the church. In reading the Scriptures "here a little there a little" (Isaiah 28:10), one can glean much of the personal history of the apostle Paul to see that indeed he was one of the "heroes of the faith."

Paul reveals much about himself in Acts 22:3: "I am verily a man which am a Jew, born in Tarsus, a city in Cilicia, yet brought up in this city at the feet of Gamaliel, and taught according to the perfect manner of the law of the fathers, and was zealous toward God, as ye all are this day." So we can see that he was highly educated and was also a "Pharisee, and the son of a Pharisee" (Acts 23:6).

But after His conversion, Paul was really a changed person. He was now a humble man. He did not flout his formal high social standing or the education he received from the finest teachers of that day. Later, in a letter to the Church at Corinth, he said, "For I am the least of the apostles, that am not meet to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God" (1 Corinthians 15:9).

Paul was a highly trained Jew, and his understanding of the law, tradition, Israel's history, and God's grace and love had to be completely rethought. As Paul went on with his ministry, later he and Barnabas got together at Antioch, and it was there that the followers of Christ were first called "Christians" (Acts 11:26).

Paul had great confidence in Christ after his conversion, even though he went through many trials that could have defeated him. He wrote of being beaten, of shipwrecks, being in the water a day and a half, in pain and weariness, fastings often, and in cold and nakedness (2 Corinthians 11:25-27). Then, after all this, he said, "Beside those things that are without, that which cometh upon me daily, the care of all the churches" (verse 28). In spite of so many burdens, Paul kept his confidence in the gospel of Christ. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek" (Romans 1:16).

Yes, the apostle Paul was a hero of the faith, as we can see from all his epistles. Jesus Christ was first and foremost preached, often to a hostile gathering of people who did not want the gospel to be preached. (continued on the next page)

Finally, Paul was at Rome. He was arrested and placed under a loose house arrest for two years, which helped him continue his missionary work even while under arrest. He was freed and traveled about for a while, but eventually he was arrested and taken to Rome for trial. He was freed again, only later to be rearrested and accused of a capital offense, perhaps simply the charge of being a Christian leader (Acts 28:30-31).

As he was waiting for trial, his writings to Timothy reflected his continued confidence in Christ. He wrote, "For I am now ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day: and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing" (2 Timothy 4:6-8).

These words should inspire us as we run a race to attain eternal life and battle the forces of evil continually so as to finish this course of life. Paul knew, as we can know, that as we keep the faith, there is a crown of righteousness laid up for us also. God help us to be heroes of the faith as Paul was. Ω

THE WHOLE MATTER

"Let us hear the conclusion of the whole matter: Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is man's all."

These are famous words that conclude a well-known book. This book we know as Ecclesiastes, was written by one of the wisest men that ever lived. Solomon was that man and his fall is living proof of our weakness as human beings.

Solomon had it all. He was wise which was a gift from God (1 Kings 3:12-13). Solomon was also given riches and honor. Royal majesty had been bestowed upon Solomon (1 Chronicles 29:25). He was also granted great peace in the land because God had made a promise and God always keeps His promises.

Unfortunately the tragedy is Solomon sought after things that were not good for him. The world has a way of attracting us to things that are not good for us. John wrote about it in 1 John 2:16, "For all that is in the world—the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—is not of the Father but is of the world." The bright lights and the excitement the world has to offer can be very appealing to the eyes, but in the end it only brings pain and misery.

Solomon learned a valuable lesson the hard way. God had instructed Solomon to walk in His ways and to keep His statutes and commandments. Obeying God brings love, joy, and peace (Galatians 5:22). David, Solomon's father, wrote how nothing shall offend those who keep the law (Psalm 119:165). He also said, "Great peace have those who love your law." Solomon did come to repentance, however, he suffered greatly which could have been avoided had he listened to God and obeyed Him.

What was Solomon's sin? He loved many foreign women (1 Kings 11:1-2). Solomon ignored God's instructions by marrying women from other nations. When we seek after women who follow a false god or who are involved in worldly practices, we can become caught up in the world and our hearts will seek after their gods. The problem we may run into when we seek our own desires and lusts is separation from God (Isaiah 59:2). On the other hand, when we allow God to guide us and we lean on Him it will work out every time and the blessings are without end (Proverbs 3:5-6).

Solomon ended up with 700 wives and 300 concubines. We are told his wives turned his heart away from God (1 Kings 11:3). The tragedy behind all of this is his kingdom

was torn away from him and given to his servant (1 Kings 11:11). Thankfully, Solomon did repent and as you read the last chapter in Ecclesiastes you can see a major change in this man's attitude.

What about you? Does the world look appealing to you? Is there something out there that you feel like you will do anything to get it? These are questions you have to ask yourself. Is there something out there that you are willing to give up everything for no matter what it costs? Sometimes there are things out there in the world that entice us and we feel like we can't live without, yet in all honesty it is God we cannot live without.

God says He will provide us with everything we need (Philippians 4:19). We are told, "He who finds a wife finds a good thing, and obtains favor from the Lord" (Proverbs. 18:22). When we are looking for a mate we need to look to our Father to bring that person into our lives. If we try to do it on our own without His help we can find ourselves in a complete mess. "For the Lord gives wisdom; From His mouth come knowledge and understanding" (Proverbs 2:6).

Whenever we rely on God to provide for us He will always provide something of great value. Solomon did do some marvelous works and those works were very pleasing in God's eyes. He had the temple built and the people were blessed because of his obedience to God (1 Kings 8:55). He also wrote some inspiring messages that can help us with the struggles we may face. The one thing he had to still deal with, as we do, is the human nature that is in us. That human nature may cause us to struggle with doing things our way or totally submitting to doing things God's way (Romans 7:23).

We fight against the fleshly lusts (Galatians 5:17). The challenge we have is to overcome the fleshly lusts because those lusts will keep us out of the kingdom of God (Galatians. 5:21). It is a lifelong battle, but the rewards that are waiting for us are far greater than the losses we may have to suffer in this physical life (Philippians. 3:8-9). There is nothing this world has to offer that compares to the inheritance that is locked up and sealed waiting for us to claim it (1 Peter. 1:4).

"Therefore, we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Hebrews. 12:1). Solomon had his race to run and so do we. The story of Solomon's life has been given to us as a gift so we may learn from the good things he did and from the mistakes he made. We don't have to learn the hard way.

If we apply our heart to understanding and seek Godly counsel there is nothing we cannot accomplish and overcome in this life (Proverbs. 2:1-5). Ω

January 2025 Report

Welcome back to the new Vision 2030 Corner of the CGI Canada Newsletter!

Can you believe that it is 2025?! Where does the time go? When our initial Vision document was prepared in 2020, it was drafted to prepare for 2025. Five years goes by fast, and 2030 will arrive soon, too!

When we first started this series back in November, we analyzed the meaning of vision as preserved for us in Proverbs 29:18. You'll recall the meanings of the Hebrew words led us to conclude that we cannot let a lack of vision (or prophetic understanding) lead us to showing a lack of restraint when it comes to following the law of God.

That was a high level look at the biblical concept of vision. Then, last month, we discussed our mission. Remember that a mission statement defines why our organization exists and what we are doing today. This month, we will probe a little further into our vision statement.

Once we understand what we are going today, our vision statement then naturally points us forward and answers the question, "What do we want to do in the future?" The Vision Statement of CGI Canada is "By 2030, we will have the reputation of being a healthy Church of God organization - with a ministry that is respected and easy to approach due to our servant leadership culture and our ability to effectively proclaim and teach the Word of God."

While that is a mouthful, it speaks to what we want to do, and be, five years from now. Let's take some time now to break this down. As we do, let's remember that the vision builds on the mission, what we are doing today. Today, we preach the good news of the Kingdom while nurturing and preparing disciples for Christ. As the world changes and becomes more anti-Biblical, our vision provides a path by which we can maintain our mission more "effectively". It is becoming increasingly harder to be effective in preaching the gospel to a world that hates Christ. So, our vision helps us become better at it, so that we do not fall behind our Father's expectations.

January 2025 Report Cont'd:

The first part of the statement anticipates a reputation for being a healthy group. This is a rather broad statement. Have you ever considered what the Bible says about what constitutes a healthy congregation?

One factor you should consider should include a belief that Jesus Christ is the head of the Church and His Word, the Bible, should be the primary guide and final word in all we say and do. Given that we should all be filled with the Holy Spirit, strong congregations should pray and study together (Acts 2:42), sharpening each other's iron in the spirit of the Bereans (Acts 17:11), seeking to grow in the grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ (2 Peter 3:18). The need to grow in knowledge means that healthy congregations understand that we don't know everything yet; there are still things to uncover from the scriptures. How would your congregation define what it means to be healthy, and how would you grade yourselves?

The other aspect of the vision statement we need to take note of is the need for a healthy and respectful relationship between the ministry and the brethren. The onus on the ministry to lead with a servant's heart does not preclude the need to teach diligently from the scriptures and to protect the flock from false doctrine (Titus 1:9) all while being the helpers of the joy of the Body of Christ (2 Corinthians 1:24). However, the responsibility of healthy ministerial-congregational relationships goes both ways. In Hebrews 13:17 we read "Let them (those who rule over you) do so with joy and not with grief, for that would be unprofitable for you."

Each of us has a duty before Christ, the Head of The Church, to contribute positively and proactively to a healthy congregational environment. We need to be a place God wants to bring potential disciples to when He calls them and they answer.

Take some time to talk with your brothers and sisters, and your elders, on how you can, together, help achieve the vision of a healthy Church of God organization. Ω



Eddie's Story...

Eddie Crooks is a member of the CGI Kawartha Lakes congregation and has agreed to share his personal story about how he came into the Truth.

In 1983, Eddie wondered what life was all about and decided to start searching. He found a Pentecostal church in Lindsay and spoke privately with the pastor. The pastor said to Eddie "Can I help you, sir?" and Eddie quickly replied "I'd like to find out about God."

The response was "You're in the right place." He gave Eddie some booklets to

read and said "See you on Sunday." Eddie attended Sunday services there for ten years, when he realized that he wasn't getting "anything" by just being a good person. So, he stopped attending.

Eventually Eddie saw an ad in the local newspaper about a CGI Outreach where Pastor Adrian Davis was to be the keynote speaker. Eddie says "God drew me there." Eddie was still searching, and was thirsty and hungered for the Truth. During this Outreach, Eddie's eyes were enlightened and he says that THIS was the start of his walk with Christ!

After attending Sabbath services with the CGI Kawartha Lakes brethren for a few months, a woman asked him "Do you have the Holy Spirit?" He replied "I don't know". To which a response came to him "No you don't. When you have the Holy Spirit, you'll know it." (he HAD been baptized a few years prior by a Sabbath-keeping group...not CGI).

This encouraged Eddie to spend a great deal of time studying the Bible and focusing intently on the sermons and discussions during Sabbath services. One day, he felt a sudden surge and tears welled up in his eyes as he started to understand the truth hidden in God's Word.

He clearly states now that he DOES have the Holy Spirit ---- but he will never quit hungering for more and more insight. Ω
