man, every woman and every son and daughter who want to obey God and for those who want to follow Christ. By keeping these appointed times we come to understand what God is doing and what lies ahead.







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How Do We Help Children Make Right Choices

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In the Old Testament, there are four chapters devoted to the individual, Samson (Judges 13 - 16) and there are four chapters devoted to Ruth in the book of Ruth. It is believed that Samson was a contemporary of Ruth or perhaps her son Obed. When studying the story of Ruth and Samson, we have a unique opportunity to view two entirely different families. It is from their stories we learn to be the kind of family God wants us to be.

It is obvious through this family comparison that environment alone does not make a person good or evil. A person can live in a corruptible, sinful society, a pagan family or a godly family and the outcome of their life is all up to choices they make. None of these situations will determine the future of the individual. Choices made early in life determine ones future.

Ruth was born into a pagan household. Naomi, even in her sadness influenced Ruth by her example. Ruth left her family, friends and her homeland in order to embrace the God of Israel. This was Ruth's choice. In heartfelt words to Naomi Ruth said, "Entreat me not to leave thee, or to return from following after thee: for whither thou goest, I will go; and where thou lodgest, I will lodge; thy people shall be my people, and thy God my God: Where thou diest, will I die, and there will be buried: the Lord do so to me, and more also, if ought but death part thee and me" (Ruth 1:16,17).

Samson, on the other hand, was born into a godly family and was to do a great work for God (Judges 13:24-25). In spite of this, Samson's parents were not successful in shaping Samson with godly values. With all the advantages of a

perfect environment, Samson grew up to be a selfish and self-centered individual. He did not care about his family, the people of God or his special calling. Even in death Samson was selfish "O Lord, remember **me**, **I** pray, just this once, O God, that **I** may with one blow take vengeance on the Philistines for **my** two eyes!"(Judges 16:28). Samson made the choice to defile his life before the Lord. In the end, he paid the consequences and suffered.


Everyone, no matter what the circumstances, must determine to be responsible for their actions. Have you ever heard someone say, "that's just the way I am and you will have to accept me for me."? This statement is nonsense! There is no excuse for rude, inconsiderate behavior. Each of us is held accountable for the character we have become. While it is true that God has created us as free moral agents with the freedom to make choices, it is still our responsibility to accept the consequences of our actions. We cannot blame our parents, friends or this sinful society for our lack of character.


It is not the responsibility of teachers at school or weekly Bible class to teach your children good virtues. It is solely the duty of the parent to teach and train his child. God holds parents accountable. As parents, how do we teach our children values and self-confidence so they are able to make good choices? Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Kids want discipline and values. They want the tools needed to make right choices. Don't allow society to dictate it's sinful values on you and your family.
- 2. It is important to talk to your children about values, but it is even more important to set a proper example. Your words are meaningless unless you act on your words. There are many opportunities during the week that allow you to do what Deuteronomy 11:19 says, "You shall teach them to your children, speaking of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up." In our home, dinner is the occasion where our children tell the events of their day and as parents we have the opportunity to guide and teach. Praising them for handling a situation well, and reprimanding them if an occurrence was not handled properly.
- 3. Up hold a high standard. There is nothing wrong with striving for excellence. "Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with your might;" (Ecclesiastes 9:10). Teach your children that even the most medial job (mopping a floor, cleaning the kitchen, sweeping, raking) should be done with excellence. They should do this for themselves and for the benefit of the family. Make it a habit to pursue excellence.
- 4. Don't allow your children to make excuses for their actions. Teach them to take responsibility for the good as well as the bad that they do.
- 5. Teach them how to make good judgments. They should not base their judgment on who someone is or what they look like, but judge them by their actions.
- 6. Teach your children to commit themselves to the way of God. Regardless of how difficult it may be at times, the way we live our lives shows the strength of our commitment to God. Children are suspicious of talk that is not backed up by actions.

An unhealthy environment definitely makes it more difficult for a child to do

what is right. However, living in a Christian environment is no guarantee that a child will make right choices. Samson did not follow his parent's example of faith and he made some serious mistakes. He was not committed to God's way. The hope found in his story is that no matter how many failures he had, he did come to depend on God, albeit in a selfish way. Ruth did not have the perfect environment, but she made the choice to commit her life in obedience to God. Ruth lived during a time of great violence and idolatry and in spite of the times, she was a woman with a cause. She believed in honor, courage and commitment. In this sinful society our goal should be that our children make healthy choices and live with a cause. Teach your children Godly virtues. They are powerful alternatives to drugs, sex, violence and distrust that are widespread among our youth today.





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According to a recent survey and study, virtually most of the teens surveyed, said they are influenced-at least a little-by what other teens think when they are deciding to have sex. However, many teens did say they are more influenced by what their parents think and their parent's influence is more important to them.

The National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy, who conducted the survey and study, concluded, "When it comes to sex, many parents feel they have lost their children to the influence of their peers and popular culture. Our survey offers a different picture."

Thirty-eight percent of the teens surveyed said their parents were more influential in their sexual decision making while thirty-two percent said their peers were more influential. The pressure to have sex before marriage is still in existence amongst our young people. This pressure and influence is still a strong force in the American culture.

Girls say that the pressure comes from their would-be sexual partner while boys say the pressure comes from their friends. Another finding was, 94% said they are influenced at least a little by what their peers think and 58% said they were influenced a lot. Over half said they were pressured a lot into having sex.

The other factor that is somewhat alarming is, only 15% of the adults surveyed said teens should abstain from having sex and only 18% of the teens surveyed said they should abstain from having sex. We have come a long way and the Sexual Revolution has not died down. Sex before marriage is still a way of life and even though teen pregnancies have lowered, the act of fornication is still prevalent in this country.

What does God say? We can read in Hebrews 13 and verse 4, "Marriage should be honored by all, and the bed kept pure, for God will judge the adulterer and all the sexually immoral." The word pure means to be free from all taint of that which is lewd. It suggests refraining from all acts and thoughts that incite desire not in accordance with one's virginity or one's marriage vows.

Sexual intimacy is reserved for the marriage relationship and is approved and blessed by God only in that state. Man and woman become one flesh and the pleasures that come from the approved sexual relationship is beyond anything that can be compared. The sexual relationship between a man and woman who have waited until their marriage to one another is blessed and ordained by God.

Unfortunately, Satan wants to destroy any relationship that is God-oriented. He wants men and women and young adults to follow their sexual desires and commit fornication so they will be separated from God. Any sexual act outside of marriage can have an impact on an individual for the rest of his or her life. This does not mean God will not forgive, He will if we repent. However, our sins can leave scars that last a lifetime or may take a long time to heal.

For anyone that is being pressured or influenced into having sex before marriage, look to God's truth and allow Christ to guide you in your decision-making. Seek your parent's influence and listen to what they have to say. A

moment of sexual pleasure can lead to a life of misery and it can even become disastrous. Looking to a safe mechanism is not the way either. Abstinence is the only way until marriage.

For those whom have already experienced sex before marriage, it is never to late to repent and ask God for forgiveness. Jesus Christ died for all of us and we can have a relationship with him and the Father. There is no sin so great that God cannot forgive if we are willing to seek Him out and bow down before our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

God created sex for man and woman to partake of in holy matrimony. Our great God will bless and ordain the marriage bed that is kept pure in His eyes. What a marvelous gift we have been given from our true and loving Father, the Creator of the heavens and all of the universe.
